At: The Memorial Hall, South Woodford. 209 High Rd, E18 2PA.


Speaker: Dr. Kathryn Harkup

Agatha Christie revelled in the use of poison to kill off unfortunate victims in her books; indeed, she used more poisons more accurately than any other crime writer. The poison itself often became a central part of the novel. This talk looks at how the writer used her extensive knowledge of drugs and medicines mixed with real life cases to create her brilliantly plotted crime novels. Her poisons were picked with care, often providing vital clues to the discovery of the murderer. We will look at *how*dunnit but *who*dunnit is for you to find out.

Please do the same if you are paying by any other means. This is very important because we have over 500 members and last year we spent hours unnecessarily trying to identify payments where no name or membership number was given. At the moment, the situation regarding whether to have annual or lifetime membership cards is still under consideration and we will inform you of our decision in due course. REGAL CINEMA, HIGHAMS PARK

Closed on Wednesday 11th September 1963. A new planning application has been submitted by Mammoth Capital for the Regal Cinema in Highams

Park. The application includes: a two screen cinema and a café bar on the ground floor level, the retention and restoration of street frontage historical façade, the construction of a six storey building with 33 residential apartments on the floors above. Mammoth has been working on the new proposal, taking into account previous feedback from engagement with residents You can have your say on the updated proposals until Monday 25 March 2024 on the Waltham Forest Council planning website. Picture shows the planned development, but no date has yet been suggested for completion of the project IF it goes ahead.



PARKING IN REDBRIDGE

Pay and display parking machines across Redbridge are no longer operational, with plans for a new PayPoint service to be introduced. PayPoint is a widely recognised scheme offering the opportunity to pay for a

range of goods and services at local retailers. Later this year, the machines will be physically removed and replaced by PayPoint, enabling people to pay for parking in cash," said a council spokesperson. RingGo will continue to be the main method of payment for parking, via the app
