UPCOMING SPEAKER

Utterly Immoral

Robert Keable and his scandalous novel

On Tuesday 5th November at 10.30 a.m. At: The Memorial Hall, South Woodford 209 High Rd, E18 2PA.

Speaker: Simon Keable-Elliott

In his talk Simon Keable-Elliott discusses the extraordinary life of his grandfather Robert Keable and the story of his notorious novel. As a child, Robert Keable was an evangelical preacher. He became a priest, worked in Zanzibar and Basutoland as a missionary and gained a reputation as a writer of devotional books. He recruited black labourers to help with the war effort and in 1917 travelled with the men to France as their chaplain. His life was changed by the war and led him to write his bestseller Simon Called Peter – called 'Utterly Immoral' by Scott Fitzgerald who name checked it twice in The Great Gatsby – and to run away to Tahiti where he eventually married a Tahitian princess.

Simon is Robert Keable's grandson. He has been researching Robert Keable's life and work for the last thirty years. After retirement, after 25 years as a politics teacher, his first book Utterly Immoral, Robert Keable and his scandalous novel, came out in November 2022.



One surprise among the first excerpts from Boris Johnson's forthcoming memoir, Unleashed, is that the former PM once proposed invading Holland. At the height of the pandemic, doses of the AstraZeneca vaccine got jammed up in a cross-Channel export row, so Johnson asked military top brass about sending in a crack team to "navigate up the canals" under cover of darkness and retrieve the jabs. Kindness may be the key to being more attractive. PENSIONERS MUSEUM

London is getting a new museum, dedicated to the history of the Chelsea Pensioners, and it's inside their recently restored stables block. The stables block isn't just a former horse stables though

(although it was), but a grand set of stables designed by Sir John Soane, and they've undergone a £12.2 million refurbishment project. As part of that, the stables now include a new museum, which will be free to visit six days a week. It is candidly a fairly small museum — more of an appetizer than a main course of the Pensioners' history. Opening with a representation of the all-important communal main meal, the rest of the museum fills some of the old horse stables with snippets of the history of the Pensioners and the life of a Pensioner. A large video room with touchscreen displays mounted on a replica of an early pensioner room starts the walk through the museum, which is mainly filled with a lot more video and oral history. One stable tells a bit of the story about the famous red tunic and less famous but more often worn dark blue uniforms. One stable has a small number of actual artefacts, including some Dead Man's Pennies — large medallions given to the relatives of those killed in WWI. Free. Chelsea-pensioners.co.uk
