Before long, AI bureaucrats will be making massively consequential decisions about our lives. Al bankers will decide whether to give you a loan. Also, in the education system A1 will decide whether to accept you to university. Employment Al's will decide whether you get a job, Al judges will decide whether to send you to jail, military Al's will decide "whether to bomb your home". These algorithms may well make the world fairer and more efficient. But if things go wrong, "the results could be disastrous". Just look at social media algorithms. By pursuing the very narrow goal of driving user engagement, these primitive Al's have made the "dangerous discovery" that what really grabs human attention is "greed, hate and fear". That discovery has "reshaped the world", driving the current epidemic of conspiracy theories, fake news and social unrest. It's a telling example of what can happen when you hand power to the algorithms.
