

and Gardens, but also to the exhibition of the costumes for Wolf Hall and The Mirror and The Light. Also, there is the Military Museum, the Miniature Model Houses, the Maze, and you can join one of the gardening team for a tour of their Celebration of Spring, and get gardening tips and advice or you can go on a self-guided tour at your own pace. Plenty to see and do. The coach will leave Hawkey Hall at 10.00a.m. and we hope to be back for 18.00p.m. There is a café for lunch where you can either eat in or take away, or alternatively bring your own picnic to have in the facilities provided. Please be aware that, due to the historic nature of the building, they are unable to accommodate motorised wheelchairs or mobility scooters inside the Courtyard or Castle. However manual wheelchairs are available for a refundable deposit of £25 at the Hever Shop. We recommend booking these in advance, so if anyone wishes to book a wheelchair, please let me know and I will tell Hever Castle. I will be taking bookings for this trip at the March meeting so please bring your debit/credit card or cheque book to secure your place, or alternatively you can pay online, but please let me know.

Redbridge and district has a few tickets available for the musical The Devil Wears Prada at The Dominion Theatre,. Featuring songs by Elton John and starring


