On a sunny 6th March, 13 members visited Two Temple Place on the Victoria Embankment. It was built in the 1890s for William Waldorf Astor as an ornate historical working office. It also included a bedroom, although Lord Astor didn't officially live in the building. At either end of the Great Hall the walls of which are covered with carved wooden panels, are two stunning stained glass windows. One is

of the sunset, the other of sunrise. The colours in the windows are very bright with a lot of detail to be seen. There is also a spectacular stained glass ceiling in the Upper Gallery. The building was damaged in the war and after being repaired was Grade 2 listed in 1960. It is presently owned by the Bulldog Trust, a social charity, and has a small café and gift shop.

Two Temple Place holds various events and exhibitions throughout the year and we enjoyed the present one called Lives Less Ordinary which dealt with working class Britain in the 1950s to now. It included artists from working class backgrounds reflecting on experiences of their culture and communities. These were illustrated by film, ceramics, paintings and photographs many of which reminded us of our childhood homed and living in these times

Although small, Two Temple Place is well worth a visit, not only for the exhibitions but also for its fascinating architecture and history. Our thanks to Angela Scales for organising our visit and the day.
